MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: AR 15-6 Investigation Statement of SGT (b)(3), (b)(6)

1. On 27 October 2009, I, CPT (b)(3), (b)(6), interviewed SGT (b)(3), (b)(6) at FOB Fenty, Afghanistan. The primary purpose was to ascertain SGT (b)(3), (b)(6) involvement during the attack on COP Keating on 3 October 2009. SGT (b)(3), (b)(6) served as a Flight Medic on the day of the attack. The following are questions I asked and the answers provided by SGT (b)(3), (b)(6)

a. Q: WHAT IS YOUR DUTY POSITION? A: Flight medic

b. Q: HOW LONG HAVE YOU BEEN IN THE ARMY? HOW LONG IN COUNTRY FOR THIS DEPLOYMENT? A: I have been in the Army for Nine years. At the time of this medevac, I had been in country for approximately 23 days.

c. Q: DO YOU HAVE PRIOR COMBAT DEPLOYMENTS? IF SO, WHEN AND WHERE? A: No.

d. Q: EXPLAIN YOUR ACTIONS ON THE DAY OF THE ATTACK ON COP KEATING. A: On 3 Oct 09, my crew was staged at FOB Bostick in anticipation of the mass casualty event about to take place. We were on standby from early that morning until 1500Z when mission approval came down from FOB Bostic TOC. I was briefed that we would have limited time on the ground due to security and to expedite PT loading. This was done as quickly as possible without harm to the patients. SPC Stephan Mace was my first patient loaded and care was immediately transferred to Dr. (b)(3), (b)(6) due to the nature and severity of his injuries. I provided care for the other two patients who were Afghans.

e. Q: PROVIDE YOUR MEDICAL ASSESSMENT OF SPC STEPHAN MACE. A: Upon initial exam, SPC Stephan Mace was alert and oriented, speaking in full sentences. I cannot comment on his further disposition due to the fact that as previously stated Dr. (b)(3), (b)(6) assumed care immediately after loading.
