SUBJECT: General McCaffrey's Report on Afghanistan (SF 06-03314)

- (U) ANA and ANP Equipment Status
  - Since May 2002, the US has invested more than \$300M on weapons, ammunition, and soldier basic issue.
  - Coalition partners have provided weapons and ammunition. Maintaining large quantities of Eastern European-origin equipment that require extensive maintenance is a challenge. An upcoming delivery of 12,000 AK-47s will have a significant impact on ANA readiness.
  - Modernizing the force with NATO-standard equipment in the future will increase reliability and interoperability. *CFC-A modernization plans will begin resourcing the ANA with NATO/Western compatible equipment in (Request CFC-A fill in month/year).*
  - DoD received its first funding for equipping the ANP in November 2005. The first shipment of weapons and ammunition was received in March 2006. These weapons include 9mms, AK-47s, RPKs, RPGs and 12 gauge Shot guns with their

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associated ammo. The remaining shipments are expected to arrive at various points in FY06 and FY 07 to be completed before FY08.

- To date, 39,958 ANP weapons are on-hand (41% of authorized 97,703). The remaining shipments are expected to arrive at various points in FY06 and FY 07 to be completed before FY08.
- The FY-06 supplementary funds (\$206M) and \$ 94M in redirected training funds will purchase 100% of the programmed equipment requirements and transportation. These funds will also purchase modernization gear (crowd control) additional logistical equipment (forklifts, cargo trucks, wrecker's maintenance vans, tools/shop equipment, etc) for the ANP and additional heavy weapons for the BP (GP-30, PKMs, RPGs).
- (U) Afghan National Security Forces (ANSF) End State
  - CSTC-A expects to train and equip more than 102,000 ANSF by 1 January 2008.
  - Developing a well-trained, equipped, and agile ANSF is the objective of CSTC-A. The end state of the ANA has not yet been determined but will be based on Afghan requirements and sustainability and the security situation on the ground.
  - A decision to develop an ANA of more than 50,000 soldiers will be jointly assessed by the Government of Afghanistan, the international community, and the US Government during the first quarter of 2007.
