- September TRAT will reflect reporting of the new Capabilities Enhancement (CE) Reporting Tool, Version 5.12.







- General Corps Comments:** Overall Corps AWOL rate has increased by 1% from last month.
- Significant AWOL changes:** 3 OCC-Ps/1 kdk (5/2/209th) have shown noted decreases in AWOL %, while three units have shown a 6-8% increase (3/1, 3/2 and 2nd BDE HQ).
- Corps G-1 Mentor is investigating reasons for recent increasing AWOL rates.

209 Corps HQS	1	Focus required to effectively execute long-term intel driven ops. Shows capability of conducting relevant MDMPs. Improper use of chain of command and direct tasking prevents proper analysis of operational situations and doesn't utilize the TOC as the main information flow point for tracking and supporting all operations. Refresher training recommended.
1ST BDE HQ	1	Anticipating a degrade in training due to anticipated future operations and lack of participation from the kandaks. Need to designate a planning since the G-3 is covering training also.
MeS GSU	2	Progress continues in physical training, marksmanship, ECP procedures, camp & ECP defense, C2, and logistic accountability. Facility maintenance training is in process. Conducting Kdk/BDE level training. Providing training according the Corps Annual Training Guidance. Mentoring process continues to provide positive results.
1/1 KANDAK	1	COYs do not have universal SOP, each operates separately. Overall Infrastructure requires improvement. Mentors are assisting COY CDRs developing SOPs for each area of responsibility.
2/1 KANDAK	1	Kdk currently participating in OP "2nd presidential election", focusing on operations for squad sized elements Still working to ensure the big picture is realized at all levels.
3/1 KANDAK	2	Preparing for Election OPS in Gormach AOR. Shows improvement in planning and executing of mission. Training has been effective.
4/1 KANDAK	3	Training on METL tasks continue. The challenge lies in trying to coordinate training among the separate companies to perform as a kandak level unit. More BDE size FTX's and CPX's could help to assist the Kandak to perform it's CS missions. It is imperative that the kd conduct more live fire training prior to election support missions.
5/1 KANDAK	2	Still in training cycle. Awt re-assessment due to equipment issues. Conducting weapons and vehicle maintenance training in anticipation of conducting more maintenance for other units.
2ND BDE HQS	4	Officers and NCOs are taking advantage of training sessions at Shaheen and Kabul. Scheduling and attendance provies difficult at times due to increased numbers of missions. Periodic training plans have not been developed. Computer based training continues.
1/2 KANDAK	3	Drivers training continues for the new personnel. 4th Coy will conduct a live fire exercise in Baharak.
2/2 KANDAK	2	Kdk participated in 11 opérations, some combined with the PRT. Training emphasis has been placed on TTP's, C&S, Road Sweeping, and Reaction to ambushes. Live fire exercise proved useful and has motivated the kdk. Mentors are training to a T3 concept.
3/2 KANDAK	4	Staff plans operations but Kdk CDR rarely follows and provides little guidance, and executes operations "on the fly". OMLT just completed RIP/TOA and is developing training plan.
5/2 KANDAK	4	Bad command infrastructure prevents the kdk from conducting effective training, especially for maintenance and medical personell. Storage capacity is limited due to storing kdk's in-use equipment. Overall CM3 rating is decreasing due to kdk supporting security for the temporary camp, which consists of 80 soldiers daily.



209th Corps Top Issues

- **Issue: Corps Chain of Command Reporting Process** - Mentors have identified several instances where MOD and 209th Corps staff personnel routinely contact Kandak and COY CDRs to issue orders and receive reports, essentially bypassing BDE Staff Officers and not utilizing the TOC as a central point for passing information (cell phones are still preferred). BDE HQs have become largely ineffective.
Fix: Mentoring at all levels, to include MOD, is necessary to re-establish a well-defined chain of command. Senior Corps Mentors will continue to advise ANA leaders to actively engage next-in line leadership. It is also desired that MOD Mentors establish communications with OMLT Corps Mentors to address this issue from all perspectives. The successful practice of engaging the Chain of command at the appropriate level is particularly essential as the Corps continues to improve the performance of the 2nd BDE units.
- **Issue: Lack of improved performance by 2nd BDE units** - Other than 2/2/209th (previously 3/1/209th) and 1/2/209th, all remaining 2nd BDE units retain CM 4 ratings in C2, Training and S&L. Poor senior leadership, personnel mismanagement, high optempo and denied leave attribute greatly to the low morale and high AWOL % throughout the BDE.
Fix: Active oversight and involvement by Corps Staff Personnel will help to engage 2nd BDE leadership. Since 2nd BDE does not enjoy the luxury of having the Corps in the same geographical location, the Corps CDR has directed his staff officers and 1st BDE units to assist 2nd BDE with executing operations. Increasing focus by 2nd BDE Mentors and continued assist visits by the 209th Corps Staff will make the 2nd BDE units more effective on the battlefield.
- **Issue: Long term positioning and fielding of 3rd BDE units:** Determination of the future location for 3rd BDE units is required in order to maintain an effective ANSF presence in Meymana while continuing to grow the size of the Corps throughout the region. 2/3/209th is expected to be fielded and deployed to Meymana in May 2010.
Fix: Currently researching contracts and commitments for Shebergan/Shaheen expansion plans. OMLT Mentors and 209th Corps CDR will evaluate the strategic and logistic pros and cons of unit deployment sites to determine how to best stage Corps assets upon completion of current phase of operations in Ghowrmach. Options include re-flagging 1/1/209th in Meymana to 2/3/209th, making the new 1/1/209th (planned 2/3/209th) based at Shaheen. The future fielding of other 3rd BDE units at Shebergan with 5/3/209th (7/6/10) and 4/3/209th (12/12/10), are also being reviewed by the Corps Commander. The way ahead for 209th Corps should include Coy disbursement across RC North IOT provide ANSF support to as many of the key villages as possible. This will include adjustments to the current array of BDE s/ KDKs / COYs.



- **Issue: AWOL Soldiers-** AWOL rates throughout the Bde's need improvement. Rates remain high in 1st and 3rd Brigades.
Fix: Increased partnering at the Coy/Kandak levels and the enforcement of training cycle management should help the overall reduction in AWOL rates. Specifically improvement in facilities and infrastructure would go a long way toward AWOL reduction.
- **Issue: Infrastructure-** Infrastructure deficiencies threatens the morale of our ANA partners and contributes to their high AWOL rate.
Fix: Infrastructure is key to building the new force. Streamlining of the process will allow for the increase in rate of development.
- **Issue: Shoot - Weapons Inventories -** High OPTEMPO and dispersed units restrict ability to conduct 100% eyes-on accountability.
Fix: Emphasize hand-receipt accountability and arms room procedures to preclude weapon loss.



CNIK TOP Issues

- **Issue:** Lack of Intelligence capabilities of the Kandak
Fix: The Kandak S2 was not deployed and remained at Camp Julien. The Kandak CDR has asked MOD that he be replaced due to his suspected involvement in the SVBIED at Camp Julien in JUN 2009 as well as activities in the last Helmand deployment with leaking critical mission essential information. However, MOD has not replaced him to date, Awaiting on MOD to replace current S-2. We require CSTC-A assistance and direction in this endeavor.
- **Issue:** The CNIK ETT has only temporary billets and no office space at Camp Julien/Coin Academy. This hinders the efficiency and effectiveness of the mentor team working with the CNIK.
Fix: Plan/program semi-permanent or permanent construction of billets, office space, and a motor pool for the CNIK ETT for FY2010.
- **Issue:** The CNIK does not have a dedicated higher HQ other than the MOD. This causes numerous administrative and logistical issues in Garrison and is only amplified once deployed for operations.
Fix: The CNIK needs to fall under a dedicated MOD section or one of the Corps HQs for support. Once deployed for operations they can be TACON to any unit but will still have ties to a dedicated Command HQ that knows their needs and shortfalls. This has been an issue for the past three operational deployments.

- 207th Corps is able to perform security patrols, static checkpoints, convoy operations (with oversight), and limited platoon-sized cordon and search type missions.
- 1ST BDE OPS in Badghis, were expected to end in June but continued through July and only stopped IOT use its units for election support. BDE readiness and C2 have been heavily influenced by more than 2 months of ops and the splitting of its subordinate units as support to ANP in the election as Tier 2 security.
- OPTEMPO, RECCE assessments for polling center surveys, and election preparation continued to affect training on METL Tasks and participation in leadership/UAH training courses. These tasks involved all Corps units.
- The Corps Staff lacks leadership and continuity. OMLT Mentors indicate that the Corps' Logistics branch as a whole showed the biggest deficiencies during the election planning. They demonstrated an inability to follow correct procedures to fill equipment shortages in both new requests for and reassignment of critical resources.



207th Corps Top Issues

- **Issue:** Accountability – A lack of accountability stems throughout and is the biggest problem we have. The lack of accountability of equipment and personnel is impacting the training and readiness posture. C2 shows a lack of reinforcement of basic principles across the board and accountability is almost non-existent.
Fix: The systems exist and the mentors must ensure the ANA is using the proper procedures. The mentors must stress the accuracy and consistency of the reporting at all levels.
- **Issue:** Manpower – A shortage of manpower across the board that is not reported in a timely manner hinders the Corps troop to task. PERSTAT numbers are delayed or personnel are given extended leave before being reported accurately to be DFR.
Fix: Mentors must train the C2 on proper implementation of a training management cycle IOT improve the overall OPTEMPO which will greatly decrease the number of AWOLs. The mentors must fix the accuracy and consistency of the reporting at all levels
- **Issue:** Equipment - Corps has shortage of equipment and supplies. The system of issue and resupply is almost non-existent and is affecting on-going operations and troops at every level. The Corps is very reactive and waits on supply pushes. Mentors are still having to hand walk MOD 14s through to ensure completion. The Corps has no G4 only the Deputy acting in the vacancy.
Fix: The mentors must get the Corps to improve the forecasting instead of reacting. We must ensure they are codifying a procedure and then ensure that it's implemented at all levels without deviation.
